Comprehensible Input (CI)

- 10. Use <u>speech</u> appropriate for students' proficiency level (e.g., slower rate, enunciation, and simple sentence structure for beginners).
- 11. Explain academic tasks clearly.
- 12. Use a <u>variety of techniques</u> to make content concepts clear (e.g., modeling, visuals, hands-on activities, demonstrations, gestures, body language).
